






It was a new day.

"Why would you care if one breaks? Stop it with all the drama!"


The snail had advice. "You are so careless! You should learn to walk like this. S-L-O-W-L-Y."

"Sniff! Sniff! No one wants to help me! I do want to walk well again," she sobbed.






"Oh yes, I can help you.

My one hundred and thirty-seventh leg!"










"Thank you, dear spider. I don't know what I would have done without you."


