


Meet Loten. He is a long-billed sunbird. His feathers are purple and maroon.

They also had to learn to find their own food.






Unlike us humans, Loten and Lily cannot store much energy in their bodies as fat.

Loten and Lily drink nectar from flowers.






Sometimes, they eat small, juicy fruit.
