




The vet left and the children sat around Priya.



The children were upset. "We must do something," said Ravi, the oldest.


"What can we do?" asked Tina.

"In some cities, people put their garbage into different-coloured bins. They put food waste into a green bin, plastic in a red bin and other rubbish in a blue bin."




Nitesh loved action.

Soon the children were teaching all the grown-ups how to separate the waste. They asked every family to have three different bins in each house.




They made posters to help everyone remember how to separate their garbage: paper waste to be put into the blue bin, plastic waste into the red bin, and food waste into the green bin.
