





On the southern part of the river, there is an abundance of a plant called the water hyacinth.




Nep knows the water hyacinth has purple flowers.

But Nep doesn't know why Mom cuts off their stems and leaves...




...and dries them.

Later, Mom gives her a pair of slippers woven from the water hyacinth.


Now Nep understands.
