A little stitching here, a little knitting there.

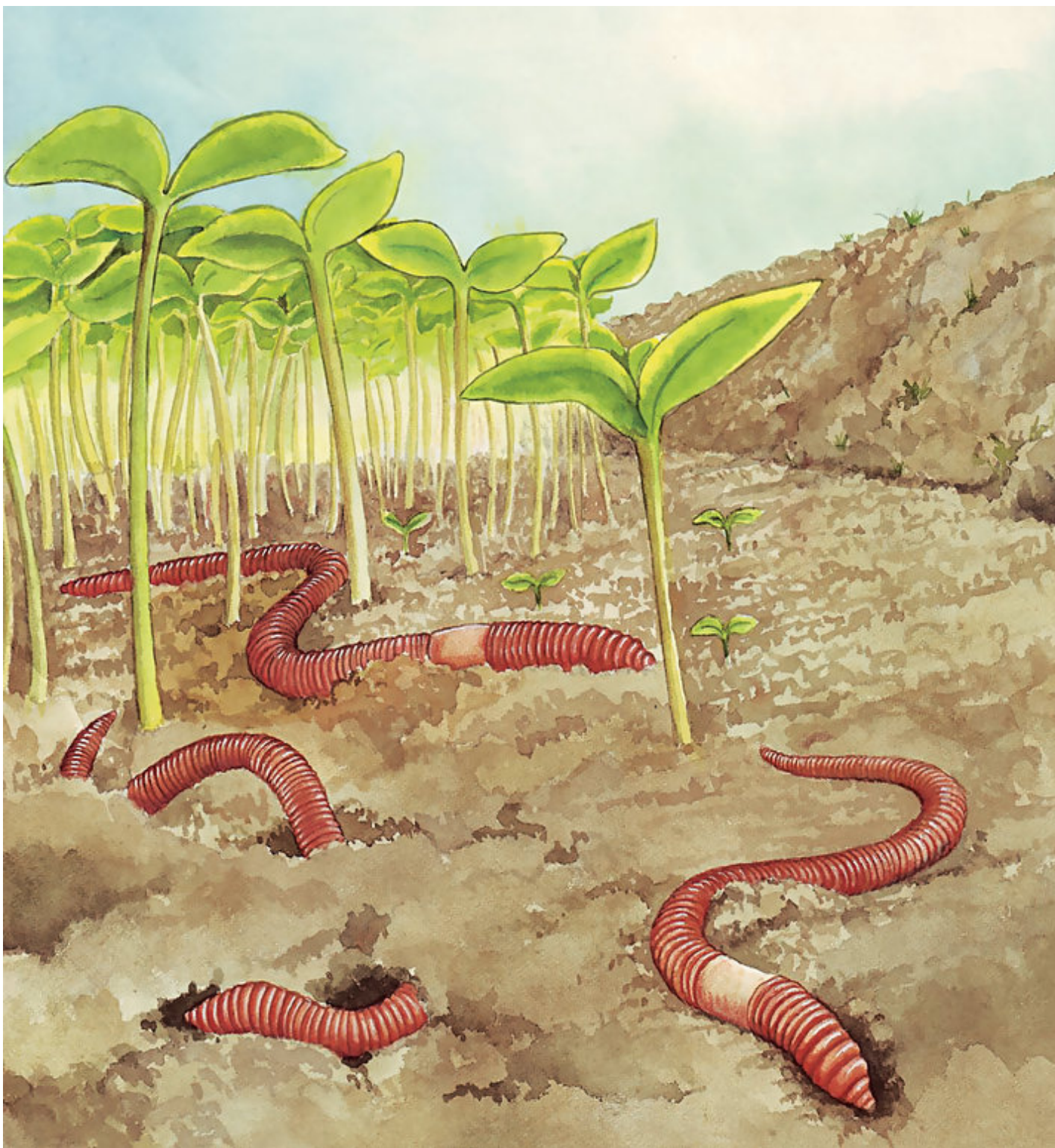
The Tailor Bird is the weaverbird!
