




## My First Day at School Author: Rehema Egbert

Other students started running.




Each student took his or her place in a line. I ran and joined the others.


Both his legs were wet. His eyes were wet with tears. An older boy came and took him by the hand to get help.

After a short while, the bell rang again. All other students were rushing into their classrooms. I was confused, I did not know where to go. I had forgotten my classroom!




I saw a classroom in front of me and stepped inside. Two other students followed me. None of us knew where to go.



One of the students who was with me started crying. An older girl asked him what was wrong. He replied that he wanted to see his mother. Some of the other students laughed, but some wanted to help.




One of the older girls took us to our classroom. Our teacher told us that soon it would be time to go home, and we should wait for our parents to pick us up from the classroom.
