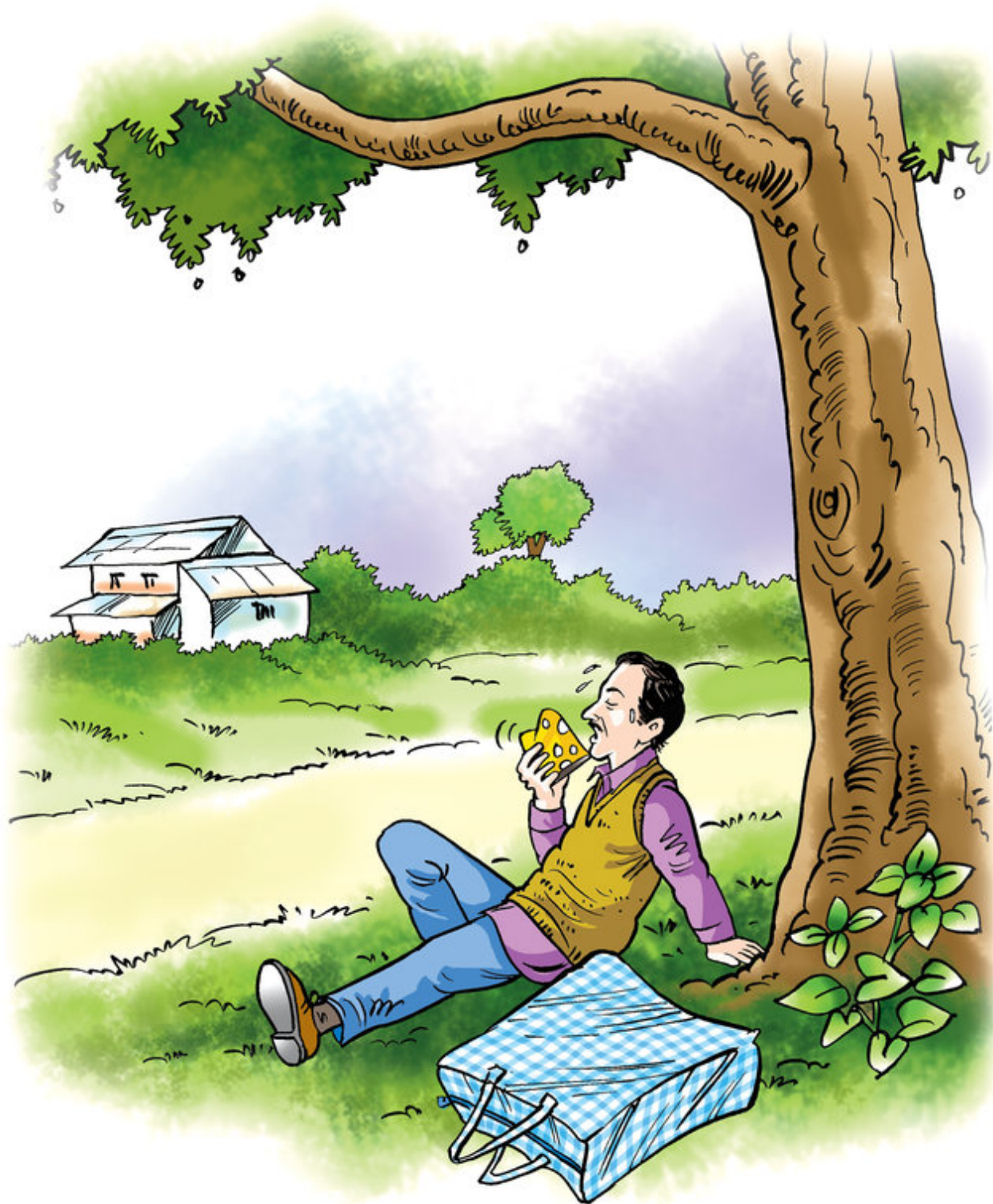


One day, a hat seller

He was so tired that he quickly fell asleep.



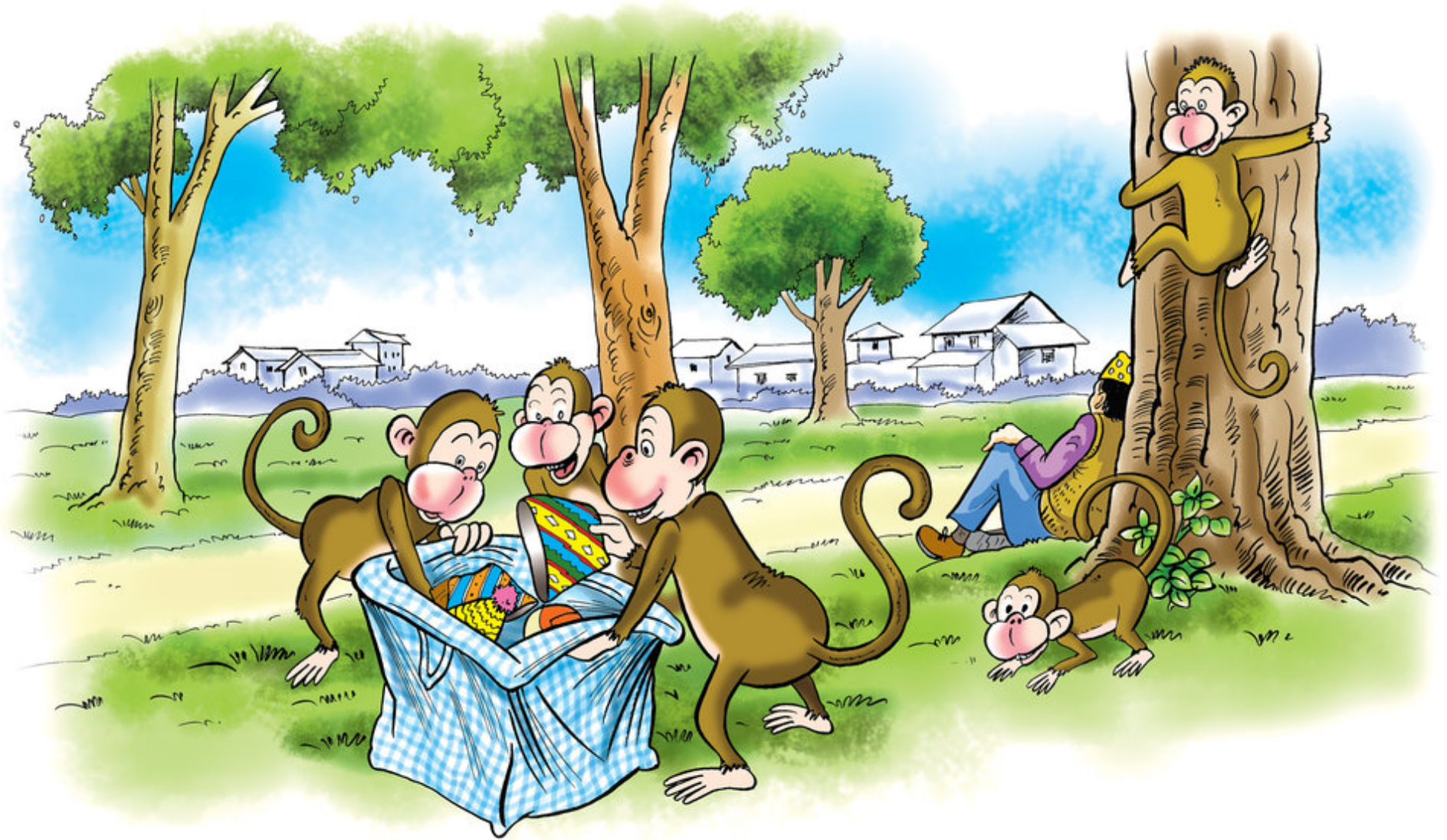
While he slept, a group of monkeys looked down on him from the tree.

Soon, each monkey was wearing one of the hats!

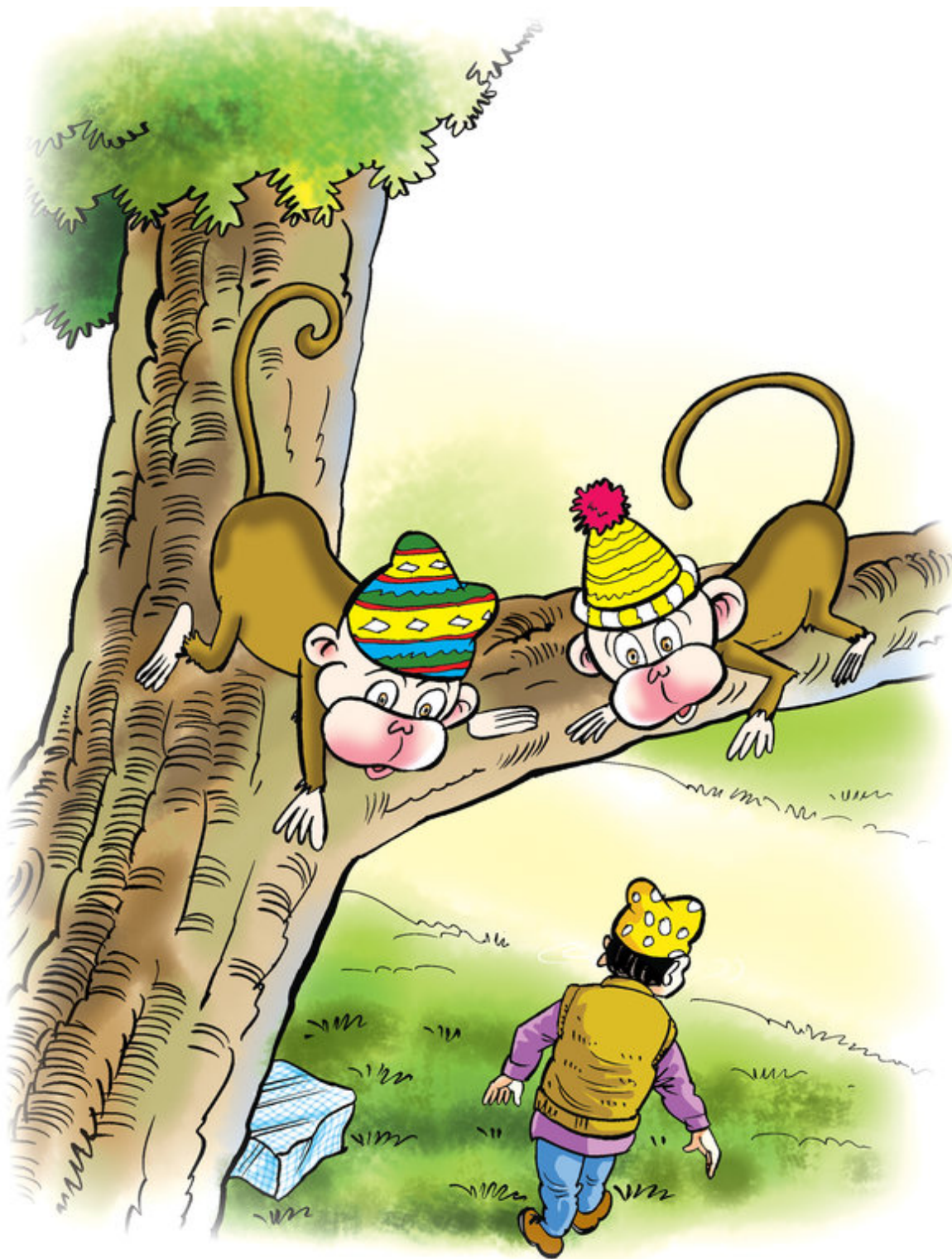


The monkeys danced merrily wearing hats of red, blue, green, yellow, orange, purple and pink.



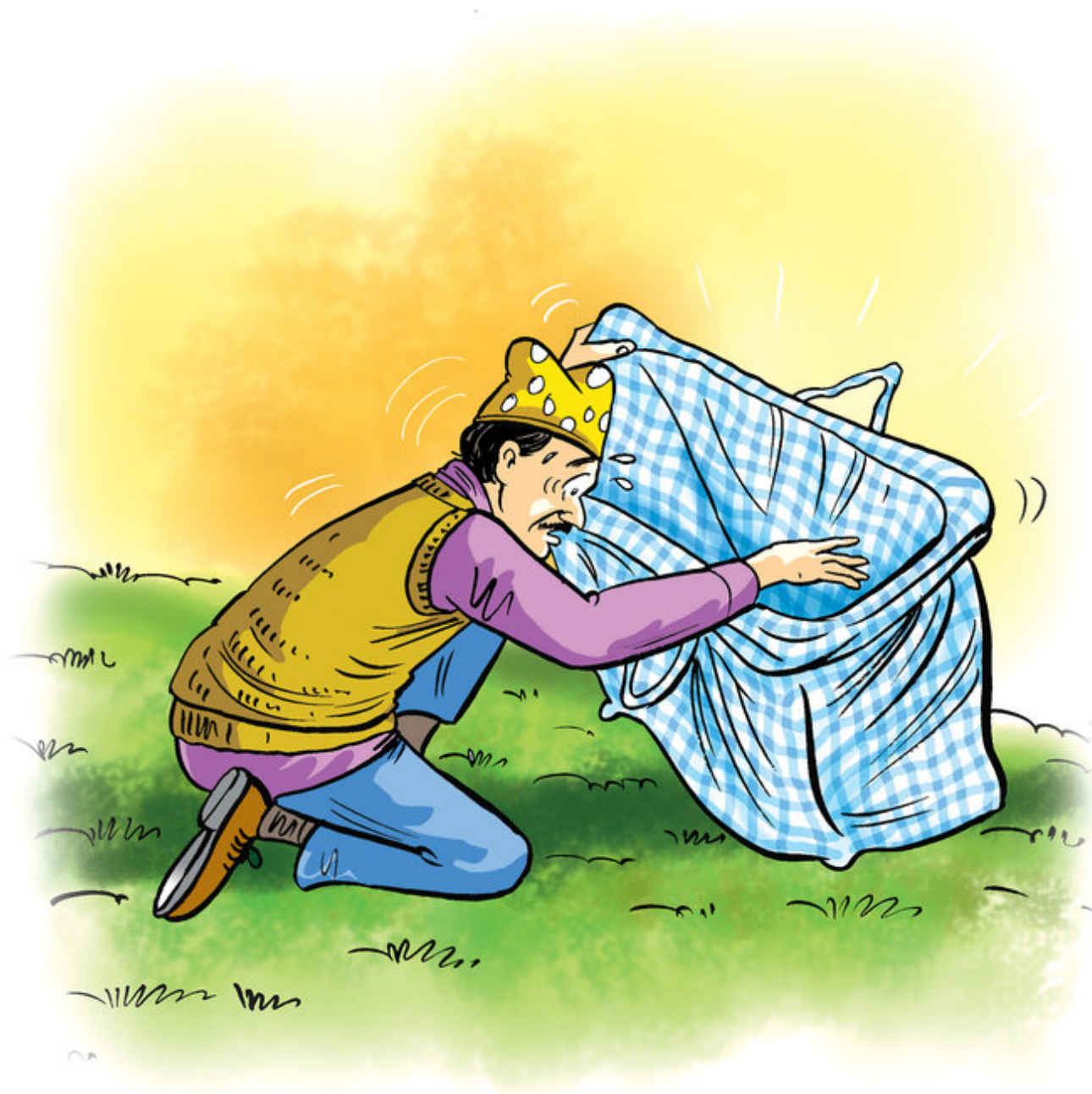


Suddenly, the hat seller rolled over in his sleep and all the monkeys ran up the tree.
