

The whole class burst out laughing: Tuni, Tusi, Tuli! They sounded like fun.


But Rini did not say anything. She didn't have a pet.

Rini named her Bhujar.


Bhujar was full of energy!


But Bhujar was not allowed to go to school with Rini.

The man asked, "How are you, Rini? You look so beautiful today. Do you like peanuts? I'd love to buy some peanuts for you."




"I do not know you," answered Rini. "Why are you speaking to me?"

On her way home, Rini ran into Uncle Basu again. With him were four other men Rini didn't recognize.




Uncle Basu blocked her way. "Let's go, Rini," he said. "I will take you somewhere for a nice outing. Come along with us now."

She bit Uncle Basu and yanked him from the minibus. He began to yell in pain.




The village people came running when they heard the screams and noise. The four strange men drove away in fear.
