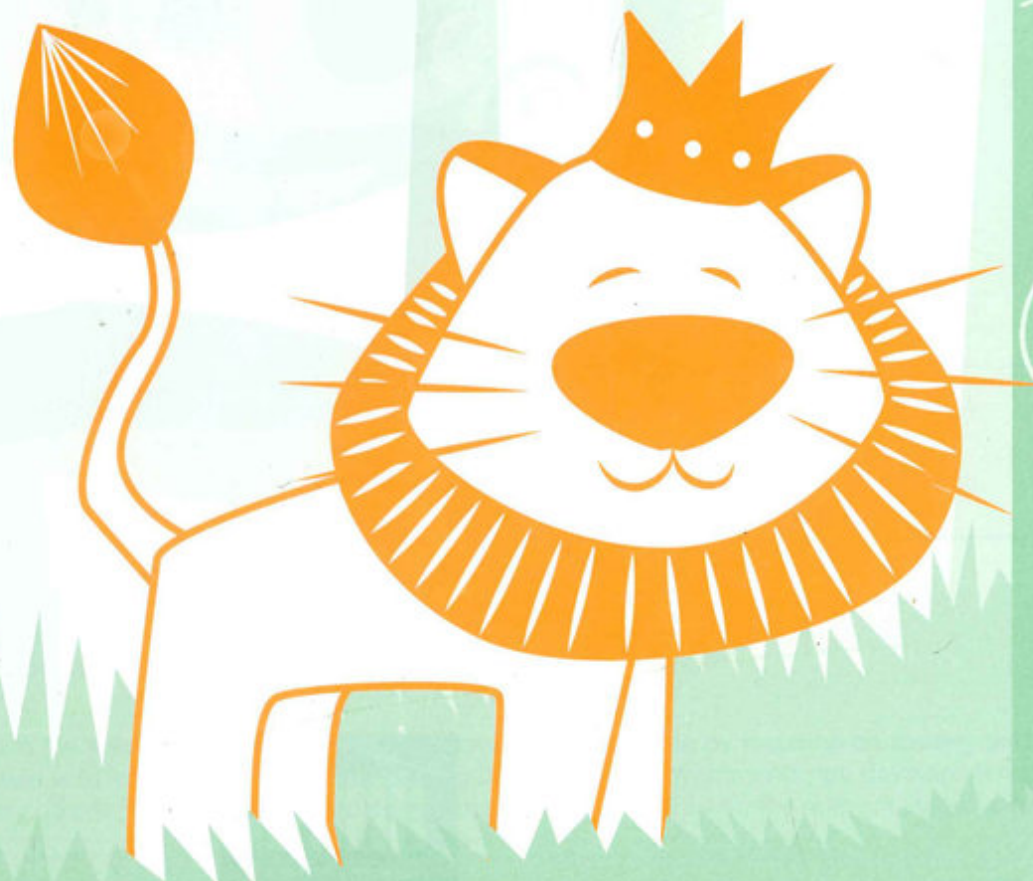

He roared, "Show me my enemy."

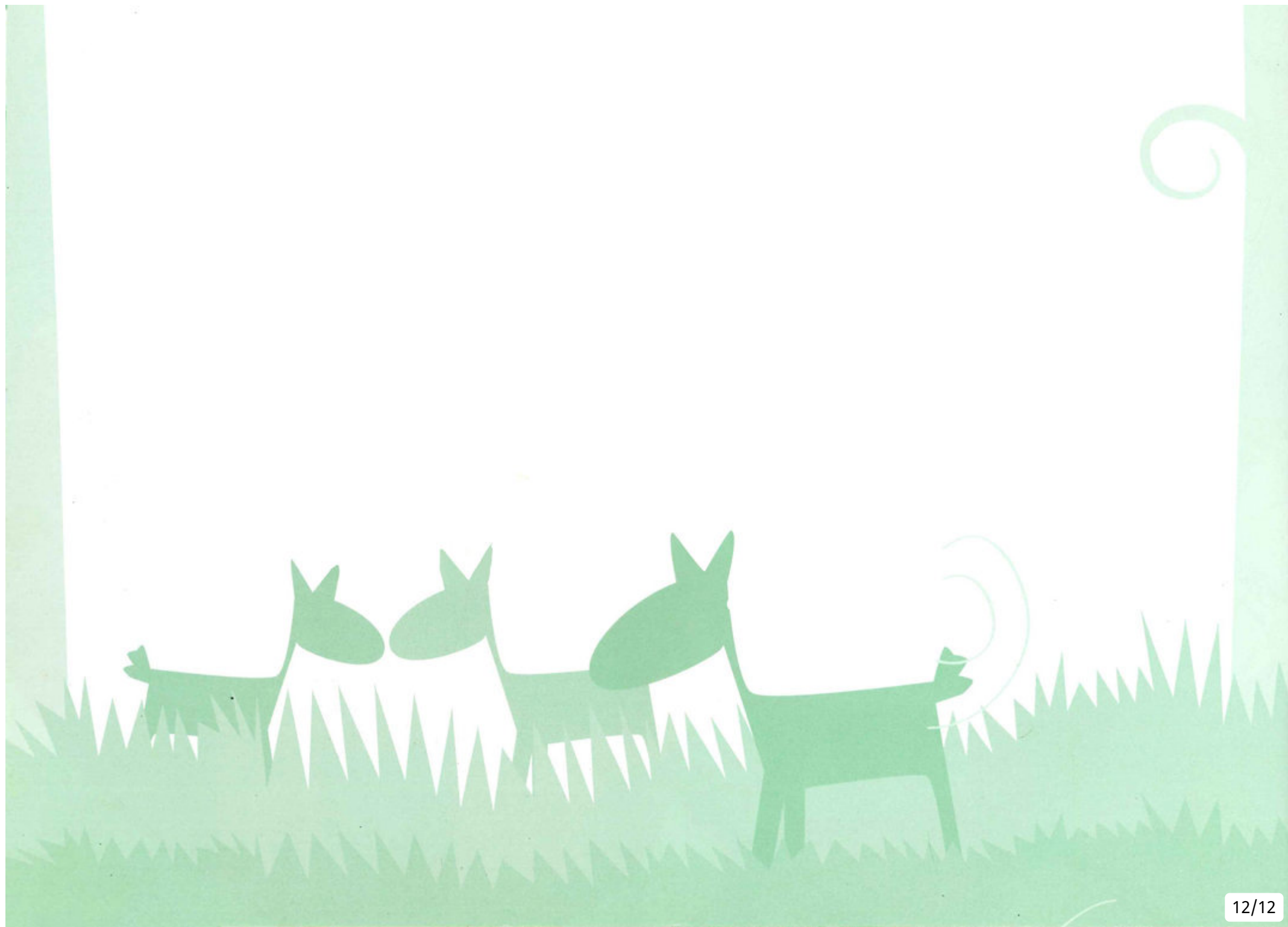


The rabbit took the lion to a well.
