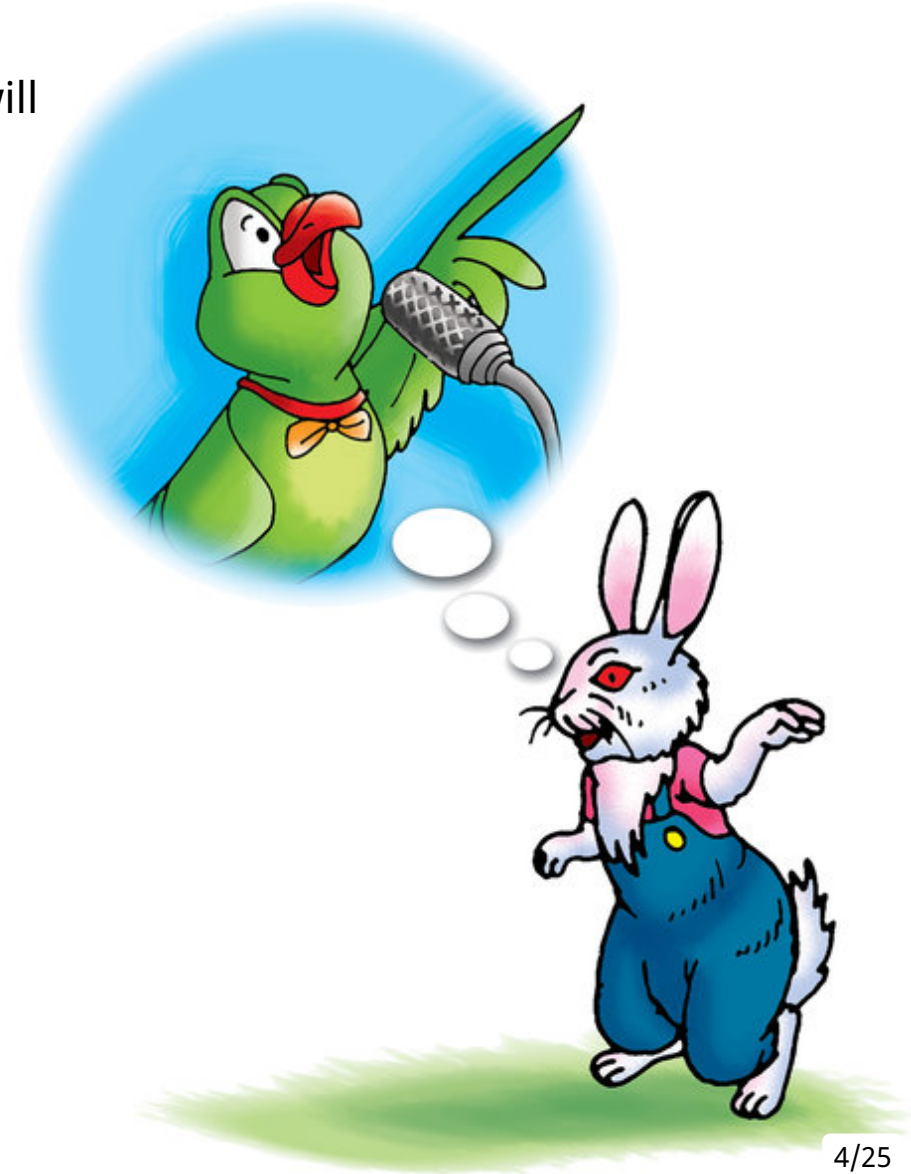

A butterfly said in its speech, "Our group flaps its wings to fly everywhere and gives pleasure to one and all. The children especially love us and try to catch our wings."

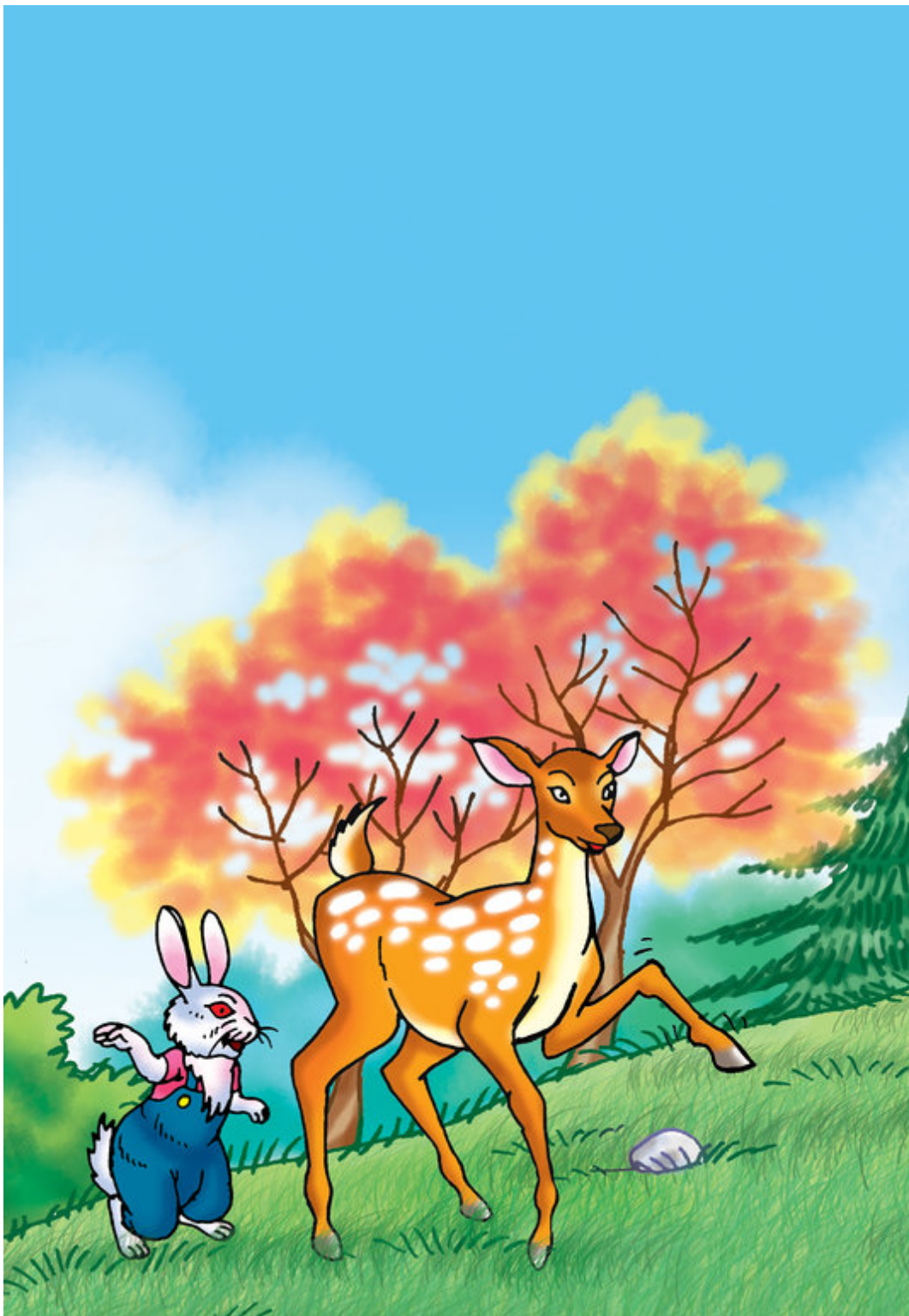


The bee grumbled that the honey collected by their hard labor is taken away by human beings, who indifferently leave nothing behind.
